RESOLUTION NO. 160

A RESOLUTION CONSENTING TO THE APPLICATION OF MARION COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 770 (THE CIVIL FORFEITURE ORDINANCE OF MARION COUNTY) WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF AURORA.

WHEREAS, the Marion County Board of Commissioners has recently passed Ordinance 770, the Forfeiture Ordinance of Marion County, and

whereas, a primary purpose of the Forfeiture Ordinance of Marion County is to deter drug trafficking, prostitution and narcotics activities within the County by depriving narcotics dealers, and those persons dealing with them, of the instrumentalities, proceeds, money, vehicles, and other items of their trade, and

WHEREAS, the Aurora City Council agrees with the purpose of the Forfeiture Ordinance of Marion County, and

WHEREAS, there is a need for such an ordinance to apply within the incorporated limits of the City of Aurora, NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED:

Section 1. Pursuant to ORS 203.040, the Aurora City Council, as the governing body of the City of Aurora, hereby consents to the application of Marion County Ordinance No. 770, known as the Civil Forfeiture Ordinance of Marion County, within the corporate limits of the City of Aurora.

Section 2. A copy of said Marion County Ordinance No. 770 is attached to this Resolution.

In the Matter of Providing for the Civil Forfeiture of Personal, Tangible and Intangible Property which Facilitates or Proceeds from the Commission of Certain Prohibited Activities; Authorizing civil Action to Enforce such Forfeiture; and Declaring an Emergency.

ORDINANCE NO. 770

ORDAINS AS COMMISSIONERS HEREBY BOARD OF THE MARION COUNTY FOLLOWS:

Title. SECTION 1.

This chapter shall be known as the forfeiture ordinance of Marion County and may be so pleaded and referred to.

Policy and Purpose. SECTION 2.

- The Board of Commissioners finds that:
 - Property that is seized from arrested persons which 1. constitutes the proceeds or instrumentalities of a narcotics, gambling or prostitution charge must generally be returned to the criminal upon disposition of the charge.
 - These instrumentalities and proceeds are often used to further narcotics trafficking, gambling or prostitution. The return of the property thus serves to encourage and perpetuate the commission of crime in Marion County.
 - This forfeiture ordinance involves a matter of county concern, to the fullest extent allowed by the Constitu-

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tions and laws of the United States and the State of Oregon, pursuant to ORS 203.035.

- 4. The use of drugs and the profits from gambling and other prohibited activities as defined under this ordinance, are the cause of a majority of the crimes against property and violent crimes committed in Marion County. This ordinance is specifically designed to inhibit those persons who engage in prohibited activities as defined herein from using the proceeds of said prohibited activities for committing other crimes against property or violent crimes.
- B. The Board of Commissioners therefore declares that to protect the safety and welfare of Marion County residents it is in the best interest of Marion County to:
 - 1. Deter drug trafficking, prostitution and narcotics activities within this County by depriving narcotics dealers, and those persons dealing with them, of the instrumentalities, proceeds, money, vehicles, and other items of their trade; and
 - 2. Seize gambling equipment, records and the proceeds of gambling activity, and otherwise deter criminal activity and remove the operating instrumentalities, profits and proceeds of narcotics, gambling and prostitution transactions.

SECTION 3. Definitions.

As used in this ordinance, unless the context requires otherwise:

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- "Conspiracy" is the term as defined at ORS 161.450 [1985 ed.l.
- "Controlled substances" is the term defined at ORS 475.005 В. (6) [1985 ed.] except that this shall not include less than one avoirdupois ounce of marijuana.
- "Deliver or delivery" is the term defined at ORS 475.005(8) C. [1985 ed.].
- "Facilitate" means that the property must have some substan-D. tial connection to, or be instrumental in, the commission of the underlying illegal activity which this ordinance seeks to prevent.
- "Gambling" is the term defined at ORS 167.117(4) [1985 ed.]
- "Prohibited activity" means: F.
 - Gambling or promotion of gambling; or
 - The manufacture or delivery of controlled substances; or 2.
 - Prostitution or promotion of prositution; or 3.
 - The possession of controlled substances with the intent 4. to deliver; or
 - Any conduct which constitutes a crime as defined by ORS 161.515 [1985 ed], under the provisions of ORS Chapter [1985 ed.] relating to burglary, theft, robbery, criminal mischief, and unlawful sound or videotape recording; or
 - Any attempt to engage in F.l. through F.S. above.
- "Manufacture" is the term defined at ORS 475.005(14) [1985 G. ed.l

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- "Marijuana" is the term defined at ORS 475.005(15) [1985 Η. edl.
- the intent to "Possession of controlled substances with I. distribute" is the phrase defined at 21 U.S.C. Section 841(a)(1) [1976 ed.; published 1981].
- "Production" is the term defnied at ORS 475.005(19) J. ed.].
- "Promotion of gambling" is the term defined at ORS 167.117 Κ. (10) [1985 ed.].
- 167.002 and "Prostitution" is the term defined at ORS L. 167.007 [1985 ed.].
- ORS "Promotion of Prostitution" is the term defined at Μ. 167.012 [1985 ed.].
- "Residential property" is the primary place of residence of the property's owner.

SECTION 4. Forfeiture.

- Any person who engages in prohibited activity within Marion Α. County shall forfeit to Marion County the following property and no property rights shall exist in them:
 - All controlled substances which are intended for or have 1. been manufactured or delivered as defined in Section 3 of this ordinance.
 - raw materials, products, containers, equipment, 2. books, records, research materials (including formulas, microfilm, tapes and data) of any kind which are used or manufacture, compound, intended for use to store, possess or deliver any controlled substance.

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- All conveyances, including aircraft, vehicles or vessels 3. which are used to manufacture or deliver or manner to facilitate the manufacture or delivery of any controlled substance or any such conveyance which is used to transport or to steal any controlled substance.
- All money, negotiable instruments, securities or other 4. things of value furnished or exchanged or intended to be furnished or exchanged by or to any persons to facilitate any prohibited activity, and all proceeds profits traceable to such furnishment, exchange or prohibited activity.
- All equipment, materials or records of any sort that are used or intended for use to facilitate any prohibited gambling or prostitution activity.

SECTION 5. Seizure.

Any property subject to forfeiture to Marion County under this ordinance may be seized by any police officer on behalf of Marion County without issuance of court process when:

- The seizure is incident to an arrest or search, Α. inspection under an administrative search; or
- The property subject to seizure has been the subject of a prior judgment in favor of Marion County in a forfeiture proceeding under this ordinance; or
- A police officer lawfully seizes the property under ORS С. 133.525 to 133.703 [1985 ed.] and has probable cause believe that the property has been used or is intended for

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use in or to facilitate prohibited activity as defined by this ordinance.

Institution of Legal Proceedings for Forfeiture. SECTION 6.

- In the event of a seizure under this ordinance, the County Α. Counsel, acting in the name of the County, may institute a forfeiture proceeding in Circuit or District Court to obtain a judgment of forfeiture against the seized property.
- The proceedings shall be instituted within 20 days of the В. seizure for purposes of this ordinance, and in accordance with the Oregon Rules of Civil Procedure and the Oregon The defendant Rules of Evidence relating to civil actions. or the owner of the property may demand a trial by jury in any civil action brought pursuant to this section.
- forfeiture County Counsel notice C. shall cause of proceeding to be served by certified mail to all parties with a recorded security interest in the property to be forfeited.
- County Counsel is designated by the Board of Commissioners to represent Marion County in any action for forfeiture under this ordinance.
- County Counsel shall be entitled to deduct from the proceeds any attorney fees, costs and expenses incurred in the litigation.

SECTION 7. Disposition of Property.

Prior to obtaining any forfeiture judgment, any money, securities and negotiable instruments that are not retained for

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criminal justice evidentiary purposes shall be deposited with the Treasurer of Marion County pending the outcome of the forfeiture proceedings.

- B. All seized property other than Section 7, A, above, or property kept as evidence in a criminal case, shall be kept in the custody of the Marion County Sheriff for safe keeping until a forfeiture judgment is obtained.
- C. When a judgment of forfeiture is obtained under this ordinance, the property shall be disposed of as follows:
 - 1. Cash and proceeds from securities and proceeds from negotiable instruments shall be forfeited to Marion County and placed in a fund designated for criminal justice purposes.
 - When the Marion County District Attorney or 2. than property, other determines that the proceeds from securities or negotiable instruments, other property which is not required by law destroyed and is not harmful to the public, and will no longer needed for evidentiary or law enforcement purit shall be turned over to the Marion County Department of General Services for general County purposes. And, when the Marion County Department of General Services determines that the property is no longer needed for general County purposes, it shall be sold at a public auction by the Marion County Department of General Services, or at the discretion of the Board,

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sold on consignment or at a private sale on such terms as the Board shall declare, and the net proceeds of the sale placed in the fund as set forth above in Section 7(C)(1).

- 3. The Marion County Department of General Services shall give notice of the aforementioned public sale by posting written notice of the sale in three (3) public places within the county, at least ten (10) days before the sale. The notice shall describe the property and shall state the time and place of public sale at which the property may be purchased by the highest bidder, for cash. These notice provisions shall not preclude the Marion County Department of General Services or Board of Commissioners from giving additional notice through the various news media.
- 4. The Department of General Services may deduct reasonable costs incurred in conducting the sale. The Department of General Services may also cancel the sale if the bids are deemed inadequate by the Department of General Services.
- 5. Members of county government, including officials and employees, shall not be allowed to bid at any of these sales.

SECTION 8. Nonconsensual Use of Property for Illegal Activity.

A. No property shall be forfeited under this ordinance to the extent of the interest of an owner, who did not consent to

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or was not aware of, the use of the property in the prostitution activity.

No property subject to a security interest of a party who В. did not consent to and was not aware of the illegal use of said property may be forfeited and/or sold unless the security interest is satisfied.

SECTION 9. Territory Affected.

This ordinance shall apply to the unincorporated area of Marion County and in those incorporated cities of Marion County which have consented to this ordinance application pursuant to ORS 203.040.

SECTION 10. Separability.

If any section, clause or phrase of this ordinance or its application to any statute is determined by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, such determination shall not effect the validity of the remainder of the ordinance or its application to any other statute, but shall continue to be in full effect.

SECTION 11. Effective Date.

This ordinance being necessary for the preservation of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Marion County and an emergency having been declared to exist shall be effective immediately upon passage hereof.
