Change your Clocks, Check your Smoke & CO Detectors!

Daylight Savings time begins March 10th and marks that time of the year to check your smoke/CO detector. How old is your smoke/CO detector? Did you know that a smoke or CO detector older than 10 years old may no longer properly detect? Like most things, these detectors also have an expiration date. You can find the date of manufacture on the back side of the detector, and if it doesn't have one, it's most likely much older than 10 years and needs to be replaced anyways.



Aurora Firefighters would be happy to visit you in your home to as-

City Welcomes New Mayor, Councilor, Planning Commissioner and HRB Member

Mayor Kris Sallee and Councilors Brian Asher and Tara Weidman officially took their oaths of office during the Aurora City Council's Tuesday, January 8 meeting. All three won their races in the November general election.

Sallee had previously served on the council in Position 1. That seat is now filled by Weidman, who was a member of the Planning Commission. Asher was re-elected to a four-year term for council Position 2.

The council also voted unanimously during the meeting to appoint Stephen Mikulic to a three-year term on the city's Historic Review Board (HRB). That position had been vacant for most of the last year.

Mikulic has a background in property management. His professional experience includes a stint as a portfolio manager for up to 15 office and multi-family complexes, with leasing responsibilities for vacancies in office and retail buildings, and he has been a licensed real estate associate broker. Mikulic is also a past chairperson of the Building Owners and Managers Association's codes and operating committee.

Mikulic has a Bachelor's degree in Social Science from Portland State University and a Masters of Art in Teaching; Language Arts and Communication from Lewis and Clark College.

The council voted in December to appoint Cindy Riley to the position on the Planning Commission that had formerly been held by Weidman.

Riley's professional background includes 17 years of multi-national internal audit experience, as well as forensic accounting and Foreign Corrupt Practices Act investigations. Prior to her retirement, she worked as a director of internal audit at Mentor Graphics in Wilsonville.

"Aurora is fortunate to have dedicated volunteers serving on its city council, planning commission, HRB and park committee," City Recorder, Scott Jorgensen said. "I feel that the new mayor, councilor, commissioner and HRB member will be great additions, and look forward to working with them all to help the citizens of this town build a brighter future for generations to come."

Museum News

The Old Aurora Colony Museum has opened a new exhibit for 2019, "I Take the Feather in Hand." It focuses on letters sent between members of the original communal group who stayed behind in Bethel, Missouri, and members of the new colony at Aurora. This exhibit will change as the year goes on, with new letters rotated into the selections.





The annual Antique Spinning Wheel Showcase will be held at the Old Aurora Colony Museum March 9 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and March 10 from Noon to 4 p.m. It's put on by the Aurora Colony Handspinners' Guild and features many varied antique spinning wheels in a living display. Every wheel is fully functional and will be in constant use by the owners &/or guild members, dressed in period clothing. Also, spinning wheels that belong to the museum will be on display, including a rare oscillating pendulum wheel, of which there are only five known to be in existence. This wheel was developed right here in the Aurora Col-

ony. Most of the other wheels are owned by past and present members of the Handspinners' Guild, and great pride is taken in maintaining and operating these wheels, all with a minimum age of 100 years. While viewing the wheels and talking with their operators, you will also have the opportunity to view the wonderful displays in the many buildings of the museum.
