

At the April council meeting we had a lengthy discussion about the city park and the number of off leash dogs. The City Ordinance states that no off leash dogs are allowed in the park and the need to take responsibility for your pets and follow the rules. Currently there is no off lease park in Aurora. Please continue to be responsible pet owners. The city is providing dog waste bags and dump receptacles at multiple locations for your use. Thank you.

Budget Time

The Fiscal Year 2021-2022 Budget meetings begin with the budget message and proposed budget introduced at 7 pm April 21, 2021, at City Hall and on Zoom. The 2nd meeting is May 5th – same time and place. The

second meeting will include a public hearing on the spending of State Revenue Share funds. There are no restrictions on these funds but it is suggested they are used to enhance the city. The amount budgeted this year is \$11,000. Generally, we transfer some of that money to the Aurora Colony Days Fund - \$7,000 each of the last 2 years- with the rest used on various "beautification" projects - new garbage cans, water tower paint and art. April was Child Abuse Prevention Month. In 2019 there were 13,674 reported victims of child abuse and neglect in Oregon, of which 1,238 were in Marion County. Wildfire Recovery Update- For those that enjoy the Santiam Canyon, be aware of limited access on the North Fork corridor. Marion County is temporarily restricting access and closing parks along the Little North Fork Santiam River corridor. Public access to North Fork, Gates Hill, and Pioneer Roads will be limited to property owners and their guests, contractors, and agents.

The county is additionally closing North Fork Park, Salmon Falls Park, and Bear Creek Park and Campground and the corridor will be closed to bicyclists and non-resident pedestrians. Public and private lands around the Little North Fork Santiam River basin were heavily damaged during the September 2020 Beachie Creek and Lionshead wildfires. Marion County Public Works anticipates it will take approximately 18 months to restore wildfire damaged roads and two to three years to fully rebuild county parks. Marion County parks sustained considerable damage with the near total destruction of vegetation and park amenities and it remains unsafe to enter the parks due to the large number of dead and standing trees that can fall with little or no warning.

Aurora's New Bike Fix-It Hub

Cycling has boomed during the pandemic. Bike stores up and down the Valley spent the last 12 months struggling to meet the surge in demand for new bikes. Why? Well, it's the perfect sport for families and individuals to escape the city together or on a solo ride and get fit while seeing their state from a new, slower perspective.

The city of Aurora decided to reach out a welcoming hand to the surge of cyclists coming through their town by installing a new bike hub. And knowing firsthand that there are two things that can ruin a ride: a bike malfunction and a bathroom emergency, they located the hub right next to the public bathrooms, just off Highway 99E on Second Street.

Bike hubs are the Swiss Army knife of bike repair and Aurora's is a top-of-theline unit. There is a pump to top off your tires, hex keys, wrenches, and a hanger arm

to round out any bike tune up. Plus, it's located in a covered area so you can take a break from those April showers.

Aurora is one of the growing number of towns in the Willamette valley with a bike repair hub and will put the town on the map for cyclists' weekend rides. Ronan Feely, a keen cyclist and Aurora Parks Committee member, said the city is now more biker friendly. "Cycling isn't going away with the eventual end of the pandemic, and we want to be a destination for those groups of riders from Portland, Salem and further afield. My Sunday rides often take me to Mount Angel for lunch. Now people can make Aurora *their* ride destination, knowing that they can maintain their bike while they refuel their bodies."

And speaking of refueling, for the tired rider there's wine tasting at Pheasant Run, pub grub at the Colony Bar, coffee and lunch at the White Rabbit and sit-down meals at Filberts, all right on 99E and all biker friendly.

If you're planning to launch your tour from Aurora, tune your bike up first, top off your water bottles and use the public bathroom before you hit the road. You'll find ample parking along Second Street down to the bike hub. And we're confident you'll want to tell your family, friends, and neighbors about the experience you had passing through and stopping a while in our historic town!

Aurora Utility Bills

I frequently talk to residents who have questions about options for paying their City utility bill, so here is a quick overview. Water bills are:

Mailed at the end of:

December February April June August October Due by the 10th of January March May July September November




Payments made by check or money order can be mailed, brought into City Hall or deposited in the night drop slot near the employee entrance on the front of the building. At City Hall we can accept cash (be aware we do not have cash to make change) checks or credit/debit cards. Payments using any form of credit or debit card, are assessed a \$3.50 service fee.

You also have the option of paying online with a credit/debit card at the following website: <u>https://city</u> <u>ofaurora.merchanttransact.com/.</u> Paying your bill online will incur the same \$3.50 fee. If you have not already done so, we suggest you register for online access to your account here as well. You may view your account status, history and sign up to receive your bills electronically. To register your account electronically you need your full 9 digit account number located in the upper right hand corner of your bill. Example: 001234-000.

If you prefer to pay your bill monthly you can estimate your average bill and make a monthly payment for one half that amount. If you would like, we can help you estimate your bill. Although we do not offer it at this time, it is easy to set up auto pay with your financial institution when you make monthly payments. Remember, even when making monthly payments, bills still need to be paid in full by the 10th of the "due" month to avoid late fees. Credit balances are reflected on your bill.
