Planning for Aurora's Long-Term Infrastructure Needs:

Looking into 2022, the May ballot will have a Water and Wastewater Bond to help fund, maintain and modernize our facilities and provide service to Aurora residents. Also included will be a new community center, library and City Hall.

With all the weather-related challenges this year it has brought to a head the need for major upgrading. Approval will keep the existing Wastewater property taxes at the current rate. If anyone has questions or concerns,

Water Base Rate Updates

As provided for in Resolutions 726 and 727, water and sewer base rates were increased 2.21% immediately following the June billing. The base rates are as follows for a 2 month billing cycle:

The water filtration rate of \$8.00 per 2 month billing cycle remains the same, as do the water consumption rates of: \$.07 per cubic foot for up to 1,200 cf; .075/cf for 1,201 to 1,800 cf and .08/cf for consumption greater than 1,800 cubic feet

Fall Fire Safety Tips

All Heating Types

- Use heating equipment that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Keep things that burn such as paper, curtains, bedding, or furniture, at least three feet away from all heating equipment, including fireplaces, wood stoves, and pellet stoves.
- Keep a three foot "kid and pet free zone" around all heating equipment.

Heaters

- Use newer, portable space heaters with an automatic shut-off so if they're tipped over, they will shut off.
- Clean them each year before using and check for product recalls.
- Unplug portable space heaters when not in use, before going to bed, or when leaving the room.
- Make sure fuel-burning heaters are designed for indoor use, and are properly ventilated.

Wood and Pellet Burning Heating Equipment (fireplaces, wood stoves, pellet stoves)

- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected at least once a year by a qualified professional.
- In wood stoves and fireplaces, burn only dry, seasoned wood. In pellet stoves, burn only dry, seasoned pellets.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from escaping.
- Place ashes in a metal container, soak with water, and keep them at least 10 feet away from the home or anything that can burn. Dispose of the ash only after it is cool.





Portable Generator Safety

- Never run your portable generator indoors, this includes your garage. Generators emit carbon monoxide which could be deadly to you and your family. Be sure you have a working CO Detector in your home.
- Be sure to operate your portable generator away from combustible materials. Always be aware of where your exhaust is blowing.
- Let your generator cool for a few minutes before refueling. Gas vapors are very flammable.
- Be sure to use undamaged and grounded power cords. Leave cords uncoiled as they will generate heat. Never use damaged cords.



Planning for Aurora's Long-Term Infrastructure Needs: Water & Wastewater Bond

Aurora's water and wastewater systems are community-developed infrastructure playing an essential role in the health and wellbeing of the community. Built largely by residents, maintained by the city, and supported by taxpayers, this core infrastructure has served the community well. That is why the Mayor and City Council will be asking voters to approve a bond to modernize and maintain our facilities and provide a long-term public service for residents while keeping the town's historic charm and quality of life.



Approval, which would keep existing wastewater property taxes at the current rate, would support:

• Upgrades to and modernization of the wastewater treatment plant and a new water tank

• Support construction of a new City Hall, to include a community center that can provide a warming and cooling shelter during extreme weather, serve as a hub for emergency management, host community events, and provide a permanent location for the North Marion Community Library

In the coming months, the city will be talking with the community to gather feedback on the prospective Water & Wastewater Bond to inform its decision-making. This will include:

- Direct outreach
- Informational efforts through community events
- Public listening sessions
- Digital engagement opportunities
