Crosswalk Safety

Be prepared. Pedestrians are required to obey traffic signals and walk safely. But, pedestrians are unprotected and vulnerable. You, as the driver, can prevent a life-changing crash by being prepared to stop and yield no matter who has the right of way.

Nearly 75% of accidents between motor vehicles and pedestrians are caused because the driver failed to yield the right of way to the pedestrian. What's more, 50% of all accidents between vehicles and pedestrians in Oregon occur while the pedestrian is in a crosswalk!

What's the law?

A crosswalk exists at any public street intersection, whether marked with or unmarked.

Oregon law (ORS 811.028) clearly states that if you see a person waiting to cross an intersection at a corner, and you're able to do so in time, you must stop and let them cross.

Crosswalks also exist between intersections (mid-block) only if they are marked with white painted lines. Under Oregon law, a pedestrian is crossing the roadway in a crosswalk when any part or extension of the pedestrian, including but not limited to any part of the pedestrian's body, wheelchair, cane, crutch or bicycle, moves into the roadway in a crosswalk with the intent to proceed.

A driver has specific duties to a pedestrian in a crosswalk. When turning at a traffic signal:

Stop and remain stopped for pedestrians until they have cleared the lane into which your vehicle is turning and at least 6 feet of the next lane.

At any other crosswalks—whether marked with paint or unmarked:

Stop and remain stopped for pedestrians until they have cleared the lane in which you are traveling (or into which you are turning) and the next lane.

Stop and remain stopped for students as you are directed by a crossing guard.

Stop and remain stopped for a blind pedestrian using a white cane or a guide dog until the pedestrian is completely across the roadway.

Is My House Historic?

You may have a building within the boundaries of Aurora's National Historic District and NOT have a house or commercial structure that is classified as CONTRIBUTING (1856-1920) but your location still helps to define where the original Aurora Colony was located. You'll be able to find out all about our district, the buildings and the property they sit on thanks to two new projects being completed this summer by the Historic Review Board and staff from a grant from the National Park Service, the governing body of US Historic Preservation.

The updated *Aurora Historic Inventory* includes all properties within the Historic Overlay zone with a recent photo, date built and often a short history of the property and structure, old photos and other relevant information. This was originally done in 1985 and has been painstakingly redone by Old Aurora Colony Museum curator Patrick Harris and his assistant Allison Ditmar. (Have you seen them out taking photos of your abode or working with laptops at the White Rabbit?) This is a mighty tome and you will be welcome to read through it or have city staff print out your property page. It will be placed on the city website later this year.

You will have your own personal copy of the new *Design Guide for Historic District Properties* which includes useful information on maintaining your historic resource, a history of the Aurora Colony and its architectural styles, lots of photos and how to go about making any exterior changes to your Contributing or Noncontributing property. Although there are no new standards offered in this guide, it is intended that the book will be helpful in understanding the whats and the whys of our historic district municipal code (whether your building is an old one or not) and for a fun way to appreciate the uniqueness that is Aurora. Expect this book to be delivered sometime this summer.
