Aurora has begun its transition of city staff as three of our members will retire at the end of this month. We have two new team members in our Public Works Department: Darrel Lockard and Ray Lowe. Both bring experience and knowledge to our team. In addition, our City Clerk, Mary Lambert, will be taking on the role of City Finance Officer.

The City of Aurora has received Certified Local Government status from the Oregon Parks & Recreation Department's State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). This status allows the city to access many of the resources which the state provides to historic areas, including 50/50 grants, training, and networking with many experts and districts in the state.

The planning commission is beginning a forward looking update to our land use code. This includes issues such as food carts, residential zone usages, view corridors, and other interesting topics. I encourage all to come to the meetings on the first Tuesday of each month. There is also an opening on the commission for a citizen to become part of the decision making process.

The Aurora Colony Visitors Association continues to hold great events in our town, along with the Aurora Colony Historical Society (Old Aurora Colony Museum). Tourism is one of our town's economic foundations. Please help our local businesses through support and participation of the efforts of these organizations in making our town a great place to visit, shop, and eat.

HEATING SAFETY TIPS

Safety Tips provided by National Fire Protection Association

Heating equipment is a leading cause of home fire deaths. Almost half of home heating equipment fires are reported during the months of December, January, and February. Some simple steps can prevent most heating-related fires from happening.

- ◆ Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- ◆ Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room.
 Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms monthly.
