Mayor's Corner

Snow has turned to rain as we head towards spring. Planning for the year's harvest is underway. Signs of our regions strength in agriculture are starting to blossom for the coming season. Stewardship of the land's natural resources is paramount to achieve long term sustainability of our region's economy. As we watch our neighbors to the south of Oregon struggle with drought, we must be conscious of how our availability of natural resources can fluctuate.

Ciity Council would like to welcome Mercedes Rhoden-Freely to the Planning Commission. She brings a wealth of experience and a strong drive to make our city the best it can be. The Planning Commission is at full strength again. They are working on city issues which include medical marijuana laws, economic development, regional collaborative opportunities, and building code. Please attend Planning Commission meetings on the first Tuesday of each month.

Our City Recorder, Kelly Richardson, has completed her Certified Municipal Clerk Certification, awarded by the International Institute of Municipal Clerks (IIMC). We congratulate her for this accomplishment.

Well #5 is under maintenance to maximize its capacity for the upcoming summer season. Analysis of our water filtration system to ensure capacity for the summer months is also ongoing. Upgrades to our sewer lift stations are underway which will increase performance and reliability. The public works team is continuing our water flushing program to remove residue from the inside of the water system.

As our city enters 2014, an upcoming issue will be how the state legislature deals with allowing local control of medical marijuana producers and dispensaries. Debate in Salem is occurring now over a bill which will allow for municipalities to restrict such activities. The planning commission and city council have begun discussions as to how this issue may affect our town. There is the possibility that the general election in November will put to the voters the legalization of recreational marijuana, as our neighbors in Washington have done. Please come to the meetings and participate in these discussions.

While everyone is a dog lover, it can be annoying to listen to this all day long, especially if you're in the middle of Law and Order SVU and the bad guy is about to get away. So, as a reminder, if you have a dog please be courteous to your neighbors and make sure the little one is not causing a ruckus while you are away. If you have a neighbor who has a barking dog, let the neighbor know. If they don't know there is a problem, they can't fix it. And as usual, if you have a question or an issue, give me a call. The Aurora Fire District Spot

As winter weather and cold temperatures continue, wood and pellet stoves may be fired up inside the home.

- Have a QUALIFIED professional install stoves, chimney connectors, and chimneys.
- Stoves should have the LABEL of an independent testing laboratory.
- In wood stoves, burn only DRY, seasoned wood. In pellet stoves, burn only DRY, seasoned pellets.
- Have your stove and chimney INSPECTED and cleaned by a certified company annually.
- CLEAN the inside of your stove periodically.
- Allow ashes to COOL before disposing of them. Place ashes in a covered METAL container.
- Keep the ash container at least 10 feet away from your home.
- Keep a CLOSE EYE on children when operating wood or pellet stoves.
- Stoves need SPACE. Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away from the stove.
- INSTALL and maintain carbon monoxide alarms outside each sleeping area and each level of your home.


