"A FACE IN THE CROWD" AND MORE HISTORY IN YOUR OWN BACKYARD!

The Old Aurora Colony Museum's current exhibit "Face in the Crowd- the Aurora Colony and the Oregon Trail Pioneers" at the Old Aurora Colony Museum will be up on display through September 28 so hurry on down! This exhibit celebrates the historic 1874 reunion in Aurora of the French Prairie and other Oregon pioneers. A large photograph of many of those 1,500 reunion attendees is on display. The Museum staff and volunteers have been able to identify less than a dozen people — maybe you can pick out a face in the crowd?

The selection of Aurora as the site for the June 1874 Oregon Pioneer Association reunion was the culmination of years of relationship building between Dr. Wilhelm Keil and several other key pioneer leaders. Following the establishment of Aurora Mills in 1856, Dr. Keil set to work negotiating land and business deals that served not only the needs of the Colony but contributed also to the well-being of his non-Colony neighbors. By 1868 the Aurora Colonists had completed their new park. The grounds were beautifully laid out with orchards, a bandstand, and a kitchen for preparing food. By 1870 Aurora was a regular train stop on the California - Oregon railway and the three story Pioneer Hotel was a welcomed destination for weary travelers. So, by the time 1,500 souls descended on Aurora in June of 1874, the Colonists were more than ready to welcome these guests—and the rest, as they say, is history!

Museum admission is always free to members. Adults - \$6.00; Seniors & AAA members - \$5.00: Students - \$2.00. The Old Aurora Colony Museum is open Tuesday through Saturday, 11 am to 4 pm and open Sundays 12 noon to 4 pm. Closed major holidays.

Solicitors. The very mention brings a strange feeling inside. Sure you would love to have a \$6000.00 set of encyclopedias that will be outdated by the time you get the last one. And the magical mixture of whatever they are putting on my carpet does make it so "clean". I think. (Of course the fact they just removed some spilt paint off my concrete with it makes me second guess letting them put it on my floors).

So how do we deal with them to be safe? Yes, there are scams and people that pretend to be solicitors just to case the neighborhood and your house. So what do you need to know?

First, by law and City Ordinance, all solicitors must be licensed and have a permit from the city or county that they are soliciting. ALWAYS ask for the license and permit. If they don't have a license or permit then don't buy anything and call City Hall or me. Get a description and direction of travel. And when I say call, I mean right after you close the door in his face, dial the phone. 40 minutes later does no one any good.

Second, there is NO REASON for them to come into your house. If they become pushy, stop talking to them, close the door and call immediately. Same rules apply as above; description, direction.

Third, Most of the items they are "selling" you can pick up from a reliable source - Home Depot, Lowes or a local store. Most major businesses WILL NOT solicit you because their product speaks for itself. Go there instead.

If by chance you decide to hear what they have to say and let them come in for a cup of coffee to sell you over priced bleach, remember, you have the right at any time to tell them NO and to leave. If they refuse they are trespassing. It is always a good idea to grab your phone when you allow them in. In fact, it's a good idea to grab your phone ANYTIME you have someone over to work on your cable, air conditioning, fridge or yard. In a pinch you can at least call 9-1-1 AND HANG UP. Police will respond immediately to 9-1-1 hang up calls to check it out.
