Preserving the Past for the Future

Preserving the Past for the Future is the 2013 theme for the City of Aurora's annual Aurora Colony Days celebration on August 9th-11th. This year's theme is in partnership with the Old Aurora Colony Museum's 50th anniversary. The weekend long celebration kicks off Friday night with the artist reception, followed Saturday morning by a 1k/5k run/walk and our popular Outdoor Antiques Faire, Art Show & Sale, annual parade and runs into the evening with our "Celebration in the Park".

Friday Events

Aurora Arts Association Artists' Reception: Open to the Public Friday night 6 - 8 p.m. at the Pythian Hall located at 2nd and Liberty Street.

Saturday Events

The historic streets of downtown Aurora will be closed and filled with the booths of quality antiques dealers from around the Northwest. The show offers visitors country primitives, antique furniture, collectable china, glassware, advertising and more. Show runs 8 a.m.- 4:00 p.m.

Wake-up at 7:30 a.m. with the 5k run/walk. The second annual run/walk is a timed event beginning at the Old Aurora Colony Museum and will take you through the historic streets of Aurora. Following at 8:30 is the kids 1k run/walk. Register online at nspirelive.com. All proceeds go toward the 2014 Aurora Summer Concert Series.

The annual parade begins at 11 a.m. and runs along Liberty and Main Streets. Registration forms for the parade are online at auroracolony.com or available at Aurora City Hall. After the parade, enjoy shopping and lunch, the Aurora Arts Association Art Show & Sale, and free self-guided tours of the Old Aurora Colony Museum.

Rounding out Saturday's events will be the annual "Celebration in the Park". Great family-friendly entertainment, presented by The Kennedy Team RE/Max equity group, will take place between 5-10 p.m. in the Aurora City Park. The evening kicks off at 5 p.m. with local music by Tongue & Groove (Joel Futch and friends). Then plan on dancing the night away to your favorite 80s hits with The Poor Sports. Food is available for purchase with wine and beer by Pheasant Run Winery.

Sunday Events

The Aurora Arts Association Art Show & Sale is open all weekend at the Pythian Hall, 2nd and Liberty St. Hours are 10 a.m.- 5 p.m. on Saturday and noon until 5 pm on Sunday.

The Old Aurora Colony Museum is open all weekend with living history demonstrations and a rummage sale. Saturday, August 10, 11 a.m.- 4 p.m., Free admission, "Ring of Fire" wheelwright demonstration, living history hands-on activities, yard sale (starts at 8 a.m.). Open Sunday, August 12, 11 a.m.- 4 p.m.

On Patrol

Finally the warm summer weather is upon us. It is a great time for some spring cleaning. This is also a great time to check on the safety of our houses. Make time to get out there and replace those burned out light bulbs on the outside of your house. Make sure your shrubs are trimmed back and you can see the house number and entrance to your house. It doesn't seem like a big deal until the ambulance is trying to find your house number in the middle of the night. It's always best to use contrasting colors.

It's also a great time to check on that A.C. unit. Nothing is worse than the temperature getting up to the hundreds, you go to turn on the A.C. and it's broken. Now you have to wait for the HVAC guy to show up during the busiest time of the year.

Also, check all the fluids in your vehicle. Make it a habit every spring and fall to double check the fluids in your vehicle, check your air pressure in all FIVE of your tires, and turn the A.C. on to make sure it works. It's the simple checks that can save you a five hour wait on the side of the highway in the blistering heat waiting on a tow truck.

As our kids get out there to ride their bikes or their rip stick, it's a good time to also check the fit of their helmet and the fit of their bike. They should be able to stand with both feet touching flat on the ground. The helmet should be snug and not move at all when they shake their heads.

BICYCLE SAFETY TIPS — PART 2

- **HAND SIGNALS** Hand signals tell motorists and pedestrians what you intend to do. Signal as a matter of law, of courtesy, and of self-protection.
- **RIDE IN MIDDLE OF LANE IN SLOW TRAFFIC** Get in the middle of the lane at busy intersections and whenever you are moving at the same speed as traffic.
- CHOOSE THE BEST WAY TO TURN LEFT 2 Choices: (1) Like an auto: signal move into the left turn lane and turn left. (2) Like a pedestrian: ride straight to the far side crosswalk. Walk your bike across.



MAKE EYE CONTACT WITH DRIVERS – Assume that other drivers don't see you until you are sure that they do. Eye contact is important with any driver which might pose a threat to your safety. Remember to always ride defensively.

- **AVOID ROAD HAZARDS** Watch out for parallel-slat sewer grates, gravel, ice, or debris. Cross railroad tracks at right angles.
- **USE LIGHTS AT NIGHT** The law requires a white headlight (visible from at least 500 feet ahead) and a rear reflector or taillight (visible up to 300 feet from behind).
- **KEEP BIKE IN GOOD REPAIR** Adjust your bike to fit you and keep it working properly. Check brakes and tires regularly. Routine maintenance is simple and you can learn to do it yourself.


